Letting Go for Lent

Christians around the globe have begun the *Season of Lent* with us. It is an old Christian tradition that is observed in a variety of ways. From "giving up a bad habit, or two, to fasting for 40 days". Lent has been observed by Christians as a yearly "re-set button."

For Progressive Christians, Lent is less about reminding ourselves "how sinful we are" and more about having an opportunity to "try on" something new. The promise of Easter is sure. We will celebrate new life, have resurrection hope and the fulfillment of God's presence. How we get there is up to us.

I find Lent to be a good time to deal with my "white knuckle" tendencies. You know the ones we're talking about, right? Those ideas or practices or assumptions that we've owned for so long that the thought of letting them go produces resistance and fear. We like to think we are open to new ideas but find our intellectual and spiritual knuckles "white with resistance". It happens to all of us, so let's use those insights to trust God's grace once again.

One of the easiest ways to discover one's own "white knuckle" tendencies is to follow our unwillingness to consider something new. It is an old spiritual principle that can help us here: When something new makes us want to "dig in" instead of listening, we might be "white knuckling". We say we trust God's grace to guide us in all things... "Let's put it in practice."

For example, how do we participate in perpetuating racist systems in our world, when we abhor the idea of how racism robs all of us of our

humanity? We are aware of the systemic nature that makes some winners and others losers. We are aware that wealth, race, gender, culture, accessibility and so many other privileges are used

as weapons. We have recognized ways we have participated in those systemic structures in previous times. We want to be on the right side of history. We want to be the "good guys" in this struggle.


Peeling back another layer is almost always painful, but God's grace has moved us to healing before. There is no reason to assume that this grace won't sustain us with any new discovery. So, give it a try this Lent. It is only 40 days. Try it on. Give yourself permission to be wrong. Assume there is

It's very common to hear the Pastor talk about the need for every Christian to have an ongoing prayer life. Yet, what about the Pastor's prayer life. Well, I thought I would just share what my prayer is like for me.

As a Pastor, I'm always praying. Just this past week, I must have prayer special prayers with and for others and the church 20 or more times. However, I must confess that I get busy like everyone else and, if I'm not careful, I will find myself forgetting to have my own personal prayer time for me. When I miss the mark, as I did on an occasion this past week, I don't beat myself up. I ask God to forgive me and continue on in my prayer life.

There have been many things that have greatly aided my on-going prayer life. I want to share just two of them with you. The first encounter was in the late 1970s with Rosalind Rinker and then reading her book, "Prayer, Conversing With God." This encounter with this wonderful lady and then reading her book taught me to think of God as my best friend and treat prayer as a conversation with


that best friend.

discipline manner of prayer that, at first, seemed to be the same every week. Over the years, I came to be blessed by praying prayers that saints before me had prayed for centuries. It was here that I was introduced to the "Daily Office" which has scripture readings and special prayers for every day. I have

come to model my current prayer life based on the "Daily Office" that offers at least 4 scripture readings and discipline prayer times but also has a time for personal daily prayer with God.

There have been other things that greatly aided my personal prayer life; but the point is that a healthy prayer life does not remain the same throughout one's life. As you learn new things about prayer, use them to develop your prayer life and relationship with God.

Use them in a way that will encourage you to pray regularly not just for others or for things you need, but to grow your relationship with God.

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Aunt Louise's Old Fashioned Red Velvet Cake

Cake

½ Cup Shortening or Butter (I use Butter)

- 1 ½ Cups Sugar
- 2 Eggs
- 2 oz. Red Food Coloring
- 1 Teaspoon of Vanilla
- 2 Teaspoons of Cocoa (Don't Skimp)
- 1 Teaspoon of Salt
- 1 Cup of Buttermilk
- 2 1/4 Cups Flour (Plain)
- 1 Teaspoon Baking Soda
- 1 Teaspoon Vinegar

Mix Vinegar and Soda and set aside. Cream the Butter and Sugar well, then add Eggs and blend well. Make a paste of Food Coloring and Cocoa, then add Flour, Salt, Vanilla and Buttermilk to recipe and blend well. Add Coloring and Cocoa Paste mixture, then add Vinegar and Soda mixture and blend well. Grease and flour dust

two eight inch round cake pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes (NOTE: Check at 25 minutes so not to overcook.) Let cool before frosting.

Inside Filling

- 1 8oz Package of Cream Cheese
- 1 Stick Butter or Margarine
- 1 Box Powdered Sugar
- 1 Cup Chopped Pecans
- 1 Teaspoon Vanilla

Cut layers in half, making 4 layers, mix all ingredients together and put between 3 layers.

Outside frosting

- 3 Tablespoons Flour
- 1 Cup Milk
- 1 Cup Powdered Sugar
- 1 Cup Butter
- 1 Teaspoon Vanilla
- 1 Cup Nuts (optional)

Add 3 Tablespoons of Flour and Milk over low heat to a thick paste, continually stirring and let cool. Cream the Butter, Sugar and Mixed Paste with it, then vanilla, mix until smooth and fluffy. Put in the fridge to cool, for covering the cake later.
