## WILLIE E. WILLIAMS, SR. & WILLIE E.



Art started for me with middle school class projects and a weekend art class financed by my grandmother. Subsequently, my first art piece titled "Shoe Shine Boy" was the beginning of my artist journey. Now 40 years later with experience and degrees in Architecture (BS and MA) from Tuskegee University, I have come full circle using art as my platform to express those experiences.

My use of geometric forms and shapes is an abstract expression of integrating Art and Architecture through African tribal masks and I use those expressions to connect to my African culture. The use of carbon steel is metaphorical and refers to the diluting and disconnection from my culture as a result of an imposed European Western Culture.

Conceptually, I am influenced by my son, Willie Williams, Jr. and African tribal masks. Although I can't truly and authentically connect to my African roots, I abstractly bridge my connection to my removed African culture through the forms and shapes in my pieces. The hope of my artwork is to inform and process the effects of our displacement as African-Americans. Through this I wish to inspire a greater and deeper appreciation of our culture, community, and relationships.



My creative philosophy is inspired by Paul Roberson's quote that artists are "the gatekeepers of the truth." The concept of truth is relative to the individual, but to me it means authenticity - in who you are and to the experience you come from. I create with this though in mind as I delve into themes related to African-American culture, which is a multifaceted identity within itself. I interchangeably work in the mediums of sculpture, painting, and drawing to represent different aspects of my culture in a variety of ways, which all working together to achieve my purpose of positively representing and preserving African-American culture beyond the stereotypes that has undermined its greatness.

I am a native of Birmingham, AL. I received formal art training from the Alabama School of Fine Arts from 2009-2014, where I graduated from the Visual Arts Department. Following graduation, I attended Birmingham-Southern College, receiving a B.F.A in art in May of 2018. I currently own and operate my studio and gallery, Studio 2500, which is located in North Birmingham. Notable achievements include national recognition in the Young Artist Association. Features include the City of Birmingham's segment 99 Voices, BhamTimes, The Birmingham Times, AL.com. I have also exhibited and displayed my work in various parts of the country including Chicago, NYC, Houston, and Atlanta.
